ABUSE IN LATER LIFE: A SILENT PROBLEM

Abuse in Later Life is a silent problem that deprives older adults of their dignity, health, and security. Every day an older person faces abuse by someone they know well and with whom they have an ongoing relationship. Almost 60% of abusers are a member of their family and two thirds of offenders are adult children and spouses. (National Council on Aging NCOA.org, 2021).

Intimate Partner Violence and Elder

Abuse are Crimes. Abusers are apt to blame their victims, make excuses for their behavior, or deny wrongdoing. But their behavior can never be justified.

Education and support are vital to an older victim's safety. Secrecy is an abuser's best protection (National Center on Elder Abuse, www.ncea.aoa.gov, 2005).



AM I BEING HARMED?

Does someone...

- Hit, grab, or restrain you physically?
- Withhold your medications, medical care and food necessary to maintain your health?
- Look at or touch you sexually in ways that make you feel uncomfortable?
- Constantly put you down or call you names?
- Threaten to harm or is harming your pet or service animal?
- Isolate you from friends, family, grandchildren or prevent you from reading your mail or talking on the phone?
- Take your money, (e.g., Social Security checks, retirement pension or disability payments?
- Destroy or steal your personal property or accessibility devices?
- Monitor your emails, text messages, or websites you visit?

If you answered "yes" to any of these questions, you have experienced abuse.

WHO CAN HELP ME?

What can I do if I am being abused?

Your safety and your well-being are important. No one deserves to be abused. It is not your fault and you are not alone. There are people in your community that will listen and believe you, help you plan for your safety and offer resources to support you.

Things you can do to receive help:

- If you are in immediate danger, call 9-1-1 and get medical care for any injuries.
- If you are planning to report the abuse by calling Adult Protective Services or leaving the abusive relationship, be aware that doing so may increase your risk for more serious abuse. Whether you decide to report or not report, stay or leave the relationship, for your own safety, call a hotline listed in this brochure to reach an advocate who can discuss options & alternatives.
